Year 2020 was an unusual year due to Pandemic (COVID-19) that caused lockdowns and restrictions all over the world. In addition to this epidemic, there were riots in Delhi and severe flooding in Hyderabad. Due to these emergencies SEED Board of Directors decided to provide relief to the affected poor in India. This was a one time “out of policy decision”.

We continued our Programs (Education, Training, Widow Support and Medical Care) as planned for 2020 and the Emergency Relief was provided in addition to our regular Programs.

Education Program: (\$491,038)

Aid given to 70 Schools in 13 states for ongoing education for 20,193 Poor Children including 2,480 orphans. Additionally, provided 5 computers and 1 printer to Maulana Azad Academy, West Bengal and provided aid to furnish a new school building for Huda Education & Welfare Society, Uttar Pradesh to accommodate education & employment training for 350 poor children.

Granted 721 Scholarships for undergraduate, graduate and post graduate students, and administered 39 Memorial & Merit Scholarships.

SEED initiated a new "Journalist Training Program" this year

Under SEED Sponsorship 2 recently graduated Journalists; Ms. MA & Ms. NH with Master's in Mass Communication, completed one-year apprentice training program under the supervision of 2 Senior Journalists. Concept is to prepare this type of candidates for honest journalism and to convey the minority concerned issues in India by compelling stories via text and photography and use social media, other digital platforms to reach domestic and international audiences.



Medical Support Program: (\$207,776)

SEED operates 5 Primary Care Clinics and 5 Diabetic Care Clinics. Emergency Medical Relief is offered in cases of major medical procedures like surgeries etc. to the poor at various hospitals.

2020 NEW PROJECTS

➤ COMFORT and CARE Center (Rehab for Seniors):

A 25-bed state of the art facility was established in the city of Hyderabad, India. This facility provides rehabilitation services such as post stroke complications, tracheostomy care, dementia care, post COVID-19 and General rehab. Treatment cost is 50% to 60% less as compared to commercial hospitals. **A “no profit no loss operation”.**



➤ RABIA CLINIC – Free Medical Care for Women and Children:

A new clinic was opened in September 2020 to provide medical care for slum area women and children. This clinic is providing care to 65 patients per day (20,000 per year). In addition to primary care this clinic provides services for nebulization, intravenous fluid replacement and free third-party diagnostic lab services. A “Wellness & Weight Loss Training facility” is also established at this clinic.



2020 RELIEF OPERATIONS

Aid to Delhi Riot Victims:

SEED provided financial aid (\$20,000) to victims whose businesses were damaged & destroyed. The aid was provided through local Delhi Metropolitan area NGOs, who identified the victims. As stated above (under Widow Support Program), SEED has sponsored 10 widows and 19 orphans. We provide them monthly financial assistance so they could lead a respectable life and educate their children.

Covid-19 Lockdown Support: (\$61,800 Food Aid + \$63,000 Salaries for Teachers)

SEED provided food aid to 4,900 families (approximately 25,000 people). The food aid was distributed in Hyderabad, rural areas in Telangana State, Surat (Gujrat), Delhi vicinities and in the state of Tamil Nadu.

HYDERABAD FLOOD RELIEF (\$125,000)

SEED and Helping Hand Foundation (SEED's Partner in Hyderabad) provided flood relief in Hyderabad.

- 55,000 food packs, 67,000 water bottles, 6,000 blankets and essential necessities.
- 115 medical camps screened 18,000 people and provided free medicines.
- A survey was conducted, 478 victims were identified for rehabilitation. 400 families were given financial aid and 100 businesses were rehabilitated.

Ph.D. Description:

The proposed research work focuses on biomedical instruments. Basically, after observation from laparoscopic surgeries, I found that there are multiple re-insertions of suction-irrigation devices and dissector forceps. It so happens that whenever a tissue is dissected, blood oozes out and then Surgeon needs to remove and reinsert the suction-irrigation device to clean the area using water and suck both blood and water and insert the forceps again. So, this consumes more time in operation theatre. Moreover, the risk to patients is more due to instrument exchange causing trauma and prolonging surgery time. Also, there is fatigue to the surgeon. To avoid and overcome the above issues, an instrument is designed such that it serves the purpose of dissector, electro-cauterize and acts as well as suction-irrigation making it to be versatile and multi-functional. This work has been patented under application id: 202011034072 and its design is also patented by application id: 334185-001. This potentially benefits to reduce operation theatre time and will serve as a cosmetic laparoscopic operation. Further applicable to robotic surgeries.
